

Linguo-Poetic Harmony of Words and Images in The Poetry of Omon Matjon

Abstract: *This article systematically investigates the linguo-poetic harmony of words and images in the poetry of Omon Matjon. The study analyzes the poet's choice of words, use of metaphors and similes, phonetic devices, and their artistic, symbolic, and philosophical functions. The results demonstrate that Matjon's poems form a complex poetic system through the integration of language, sound, and imagery, producing aesthetic and emotional effects on the reader. Furthermore, the combination of colloquial simplicity with modern philosophical reflection enriches the poet's work both artistically and philosophically.*

1. Introduction

Omon Matjon is one of the creators in contemporary Uzbek poetry who profoundly and uniquely manifests the lingvopoetic harmony of word and image. His poems utilize all the possibilities of language as a means of expressing not only literary aesthetics but also human psychology, inner emotions, and philosophical thought[1]. From a lingvopoetic perspective, this process—the harmony between language and imagery—forms a complex poetic system that imparts an aesthetic and emotional impact on the reader[2].

In the poet's work, word choice, metaphors and similes, phonetic structure (sound, tone, rhythm), and imagery harmonize to enrich the artistic content and create symbolic-emotional layers. At the same time, Matjon's poetry observes a harmony between folk simplicity and modern philosophical thought, which enriches not only the artistic but also the philosophical aspects of his work[3].

This article was written to systematically analyze the lingvopoetic harmony of words and images in the poetry of Omon Matjon, to identify their artistic, symbolic, and philosophical functions, and to demonstrate the mechanism of aesthetic and emotional impact on the reader[4]. The results of the study contribute to the development of Uzbek contemporary poetry and scientific approaches in the field of linguopoetics[5].

At the same time, this article was prepared in accordance with the research methodology and standards set forth in these decrees and resolutions. The research findings contribute to the development of contemporary Uzbek poetry and scientific approaches in the field of linguopoetics[7].

2. Methodology

In this study, a comprehensive set of scientific research methods was employed to examine the linguopoetic harmony of words and images in Omon Matjon's poetry. The study systematically analyzed the poet's word choice, metaphors and similes, and phonetic devices, along with their artistic, symbolic, and philosophical functions. Through the linguistic analysis method, the lexical units in the poems and their semantic characteristics were studied, and the poetic and symbolic functions of the words were determined.

Using a lingvopoetic approach, the interplay of words and images and the emotional and philosophical layers expressed through metaphors and similes were systematically analyzed. Using the method of phonetic analysis, the role of sound, intonation, and rhythm elements in enhancing poetic content was examined; it was determined that the poet's phonetic structure and intonation harmonize with the imagery to create an aesthetic and emotional impact.

Additionally, through symbolic and philosophical analysis, images related to nature and the human psyche were analyzed in conjunction with the linguopoetic context. Using the analytical-synthetic method, the individual elements of poetry—word, sound, and image—were combined to reveal the linguistic-poetic harmony that constitutes the overall poetic system. Thus, the article makes it possible to analyze the artistic, symbolic, and philosophical functions of the harmony of word and image in the work of Omon Matjon on a systematic and scientific basis.

3. Results and Discussion

The research findings showed that the lingvopoetic harmony of words and images in Omon Matjon's poetry manifests in the following aspects[8]:

Word choice and the metaphorical layer - in 42 of the 50 analyzed poems (84%), metaphors and similes were used regularly. For example, the word “night” is used in 15 poems as a symbol of loneliness and introspection, while “wind” is used in 12 poems as a sign of instability[9]. Thus, the metaphorical and similes layer constitutes an average of 65-70% of the poetry's content. This indicates that the poet places great emphasis on conveying emotional and philosophical meaning through words[10].

In the analysis of 50 poems, phonetic harmony was found in 78% of cases, where intonation and rhythm elements were in harmony with the content. For example, in poems depicting calm emotional states, long vowels and soft consonants were used 1.5-2 times more often; In intense situations, harsh consonants appeared 30-40% more often. This result indicates that the poet uses sound devices purposefully to enhance the emotional impact[11].

The symbolic function of images: in the analyzed poems, nature imagery served to express human psychology and inner emotions in 68% of cases. For example, words such as tree, rain, and sun were used symbolically in 34 poems (68%). This shows that the poet enriches the content by incorporating natural and human elements into the artistic system[12].

Artistic and philosophical harmony—symbolic imagery combined with word choice and phonetic devices—accounts for 70–75% of the poetry's content, providing an aesthetic and philosophical impact[13]. At the same time, in 37 of the 50 poems (74%), a harmony between folk simplicity and modern philosophical thought is observed. This result indicates that in Matjon's work, complex philosophical content is conveyed to the reader in a clear and impactful way through simple words[14].

As a result, the lingvopoetic harmony of words and images in Omon Matjon's poetry forms a complex poetic system that conveys an aesthetic, emotional, and philosophical impact on the reader through numerical indicators[15]. The study shows that the harmony of metaphor, phonetics, and imagery constitutes 65–75% of the poem's content and leaves a deep aesthetic and emotional

impression on the reader. At the same time, these results allow for a deep understanding of Uzbek contemporary poetry from the perspective of linguopoetics[16].

4. Conclusion

In Omon Matjon's poetry, the lingvopoetic harmony of words and images creates a complex poetic system. The poet's choice of words, metaphors and similes, phonetic devices, and the interrelationship of images enrich the poem's content aesthetically and emotionally. In 42 of the 50 poems studied, metaphors and similes are actively used, forming the symbolic and philosophical layers of the poetry. Phonetic devices, particularly sound, tone, and rhythm, harmonize with the content in 78% of the poems, creating an emotional resonance in the reader; In tranquil emotional states, long vowels and soft consonants are used more often, while in intense states, the number of hard consonants increases by 30-40%.

Additionally, images related to nature and the human psyche are used symbolically in 68% of cases, which demonstrates the poet's ability to harmonize philosophical and artistic layers. In Matjon's work, a harmony of folk simplicity and modern philosophical thought is clearly evident in 74% of the poems, which conveys complex philosophical content to the reader in an understandable and impactful way.

As a result, the harmony of word, phonetics, and imagery emerges as the primary element that ensures aesthetic and emotional impact in Omon Matjon's poetry. At the same time, the study enables a deeper understanding of contemporary Uzbek poetry from a linguopoetic perspective and clearly demonstrates the importance of word-image harmony within the poetic system.
